


Hotter & Drier conditions fuel larger wildfires




Camp Fire, November 2018

Land-use

- Increased development in wildland-urban interface
- **1 in 3** CA homes lies in wildlife- urban interface.
- More than 75 communities in California where 90 percent of the population lives in very high fire hazard severity zone
- **1 million** homes **built** in the interface since 1990
- California adopted strict guidelines in 1990 for new structures built in the wildland-urban interface
- But California still lacks fire retrofit programs

The Emerging Nexus

Water supply, water quality & ...

- At least 65 percent of the public water supply in the Western U.S. in fire-prone areas
- Wildfires can expose the drinking water for millions to contamination
- Public safety, air quality, erosion danger, financial impacts to government and citizens, utility shutdowns, rising insurance rates / canceled policies...
