







1852 lower Sacramento navigation chart from David Rumsey historical map collection

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Sacramento River Riparian Habitat

- -Supports over 225 vertebrate wildlife species
- -Dominated by deciduous trees and shrubs
- -Able to survive flood disturbance
- -Needs summer water
- -Important input to aquatic habitats(woody debris, bugs)

-Vegetation regenerates with meander, erosion/deposition, flooding;

Current status and trends :

- \nearrow increased conservation ownership and restoration plantings
- ↘ decreased natural ecological processes e.g. meander and floodplain dynamics
