Legislative Calendar 2020 Key Dates:

- Jan. 10 Budget must be submitted by Governor (Art. IV, Sec. 12(a))
- Jan. 24 Last day to submit bill requests to Legislative Counsel
- Jan. 31 Last day for each house to pass bills introduced in that house in the odd numbered year (Art. IV, Sec. 10(c))
- Feb. 21 Last day for bills to be introduced
- Apr. 24 Last day for policy committees to hear & report fiscal bills
- May 1 Last day for policy committees to hear & report non-fiscal bills
- May 8 Last day for policy committees to meet prior to June 1
- May 15 Last day for fiscal committees to hear & report bills

May 26 – May 29

Floor Session Only. No committee may meet for any purpose

May 29 Last day for bills to be passed out of the house of origin

Legislative Calendar Key Dates:

- Jun. 1 Committee meetings may resume



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



CALIFORNIA LEGISLATURE-2017-18 REGULAR SESSION

ASSEMBLY BILL

No. 2516

Introduced by Assembly Member Eggman (Principal coauthor: Assembly Member Gallagher)

February 14, 2018

An act to amend Section 6429 of the Water Code, relating to dams and reservoirs.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 2516, as amended, Eggman. Dams: reservoir restrictions. Existing law requires the Department of Water Resources to supervise the maintenance and operation of dams and reservoirs as necessary to safeguard life and property. Existing law authorizes the department to impose reservoir restrictions and to levy property liens on an owner of a dam who fails to comply with certain provisions relating to dam safety or any approval, order, rule, regulation, or requirement of the

department.

This bill would require the department to post, and update quarterly, on its Internet Web site a report containing the name of each reservoir subject to a-restriction, restriction and the reservoir's associated downstream hazard potential classification, the effective date of the reservoir restriction, the reason for the restriction, and actions that would allow the restriction to be removed. The bill, if no reservoir restrictions are in effect, would require the department to post this fact on its Internet Web site.

Vote: majority. Appropriation: no. Fiscal committee: yes. State-mandated local program: no.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

- 1 SECTION 1. Section 6429 of the Water Code is amended to read:
- 6429. (a) The department may impose reservoir restrictions
 and levy property liens on an owner of a dam who fails to comply
 with any of the provisions of this part or any approval, order, rule,
 regulation, or requirement of the department.
- (b) (1) The department shall post, and update quarterly, on its Internet Web site a report containing all of the following:
- 9 (A) The name of each reservoir subject to a restriction imposed
 10 pursuant to subdivision—(a). (a) and the reservoir's associated
 11 downstream hazard potential classification.
- 12 (B) The effective date of the reservoir restriction.
- 13 (C) The reason for the restriction.
- 14 (D) Actions that would allow the restriction to be removed.
- 15 (2) If no reservoir restrictions are in effect, the department shall
- 16 post this fact on its Internet Web site.
