






## California's Headwaters



# Benefits of Healthy Headwaters

- Increased water supply reliability
- Improved water quality
- Reduced impacts from catastrophic wildfires
- Increased renewable energy supplies
- Improved response to climate change
- Enhanced habitat





### California Wildfires in 2017

#### Bigger, More Destructive, More Frequent

- 2017 Tubbs Fire = most destructive in CA's history
- 2017 Thomas Fire = biggest ever
- Statewide more than 500K acres were burned in 2017 (107% increase over 2016)
- Restoration needed 500,000 acres/year (now doing <200,000)</li>

# Federal Forest Management Efforts

- Recently signed federal omnibus bill:
  - ✓ Ends "Fire borrowing"
  - ✓ Will increase pace and scale of restoration
- ACWA continues to work with CAFWA and other partners in Washington D.C.





# Forest Management Efforts in California

#### Gov. Brown's Executive Order B-52-18

- Increases forest reforestation to 500,000 acres/year
- Expands grants and funding
- Streamlines project permitting
- Facilitates cooperation among federal, state, private land owners
